Celebrations as Bilston indoor market is fabulous at 50!



There were celebrations in Bilston recently as the indoor market hall celebrated its 50th birthday.

A day of fun with dancers, music and children's entertainment took place on Saturday 11th March and a special plaque was unveiled by Deputy Mayor of Wolverhampton, Councillor Dr Michael Hardacre, to mark a half century of trading.

Bilston indoor market first opened on 12 March 1973 with 88 stalls providing residents with a wide range of goods and services.

Some of the businesses from that time are still trading, including Bennetts café, Julie Hopkins hosiery, Nicholls fruit and veg, Pritchard's fruit and veg, Sand's Fish and Lawson Thomas meat, poultry and deli. Members of the traders' families were special guests at the fun day.

Other attractions at the event, included performances from Hit the Dhol, free face paints and balloon animals for youngsters.

The market café also fed hungry visitors with a special offer on afternoon teas with a celebratory glass of prosecco.

Councillor Steve Evans, City of Wolverhampton Council's cabinet member for

city environment and climate change, said: "A very happy birthday to Bilston indoor market hall! "At a time when a number of indoor markets are closing, I am really happy to say that Bilston is still going strong and we have full occupancy on stalls in the indoor market.

"Many generations of city families have had stalls here and many of our residents will have done their shopping at the market for years. It's a really wonderful place to have a friendly chat with our stall holders and find quality goods at excellent prices.

"As a council, we're aiming to keep all our markets open for many years to come with our package of support for young traders. We want to encourage a new generation of business owners so we can celebrate another 50 fabulous years."

Bilston indoor and outdoor markets include almost 200 stalls, offering a huge range of goods and services including fresh foods, fruit and vegetables, meat and fish, a large range of fashion, jewellery and shoes and household items.

There is also a café so shoppers can take a break and relax, as well as free car parking close by. Opening times are Monday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, 8.30am to 4pm.



Wolverhampton Fairtrade Campaigners have recently been raising awareness of the importance of buying Fairtrade during the annual Fairtrade Fortnight which ran from Mon Feb 27th – to Sun Mar 12th.

Collaborative events have included Fairtrade Workshops for schoolchildren held at the Molineux hosted by Marnie Richards and Jeevan Kang from the Wolves Foundation; School assemblies at local primary schools, church stalls, presentations at Collins Aerospace, local radio broadcasts on WCRFM The annual Pat McFadden MP Fairtrade Coffee morning sponsored by Revolver Co-operative. culminating in The Mayoral Fairtrade Reception which brought local schools together for the annual schools Fairtrade art competition; the theme this year was set by The Wolves Foundation and was, Design a Fairtrade Mascot. The overall winner was a pupil from Uplands Junior School Finchfield, who also won a tour of the Molineux for her school. The competition prizes included book tokens sponsored by Wolverhampton Rotaries and Easter Eggs from Mid-counties Co-operative presented by Mayor, Cllr Sandra Samuels OBE.

Julia Farrell, Chair of the Wolverhampton City Fairtrade Partnership – a steering group that brings together local businesses, faith groups, local government, and schools – explains why it's important to buy Fairtrade. "By buying products that carry the registered Fairtrade Mark it means that the producers receive a fair day's pay for a fair day's work plus a little extra which farmers and workers can spend on projects to benefit their own businesses and communities.

The coffee and cocoa and chocolate that we love so much can't be grown here due to our climate, and we are dependent on the farmers and producers to grow the things we love and, as campaigners, we believe that they deserve a decent income.

Fairtrade Fortnight 2023 has been a great success and I am especially proud that for the first time ever all electronic road signage gateways to the city have been displaying that we are a Fairtrade city! I thank everyone involved for helping make Fairtrade Fortnight the great success it has been.

Wolverhampton is in its 19th year of being a Fairtrade City – the first city across the UK to ever be granted this status. 2025 will be the 21st anniversary celebrations of being a Fairtrade City.





Wolves Foundation

Our History

Wolves Foundation began life as Wolves in the Community in 1991, thanks largely to the work of the late Baroness Rachael Heyhoe-Flint, a pioneering cricketer who also had a spell as a Wolves director and club vice-president. Rachael was in charge of the public relations at the club and would arrange for players to carry out visits in the community.

In 2008, we became a registered charity as Wolves Community Trust, gradually increasing the number and range of our projects. We then rebranded as the Wolves Foundation in 2017 and have continued to expand our programme of activities ever since, with over 40 different projects now running throughout the city.

About us

Wolves Foundation is a cornerstone of the city of Wolverhampton. Through a team of highly skilled, dedicated staff and volunteers it harnesses the strong local connection with Wolves to motivate, educate and inspire tens of thousands of beneficiaries of its work across the city.

The charity works in partnership with key local stakeholders including the local authority, police, health service and education providers to identify risk factors in the city around societal issues and health status; using data and insight to deliver evidence-based practice through its vast array of projects that address these needs through its key three objectives;

- Healthier, more active people
- · Lifelong learning and skills
- Safer, stronger communities

Working in the community is vital to its work and removing barriers to engagement regardless of age, gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, or disability. With participants ranging from 1 month to 100 years old across 225 different delivery sites in the city, work is delivered all year round improving the physical and mental health, personal development and life choices of the people engaged in its work.

Data from its last 12 months work shows:

- 92% of participants have improved their mental and physical wellbeing
- 90% of participants have improved their educational achievement
- 84% of participants feel they now contribute more to a safer, stronger, more inclusive community.

Fairtrade Partnership

Wolves Foundation have given their support to Fairtrade Fortnight, an awareness campaign promoting better prices, decent working conditions and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world.

For over 20 years now, Fairtrade campaigners have played a crucial role in calling for a fairer, greener and more sustainable future for food, and this two week spell, starting today, encourages and reminds people that, even at a local level, their actions can make a positive impact on a global scale.

That is why Wolves Foundation have – for the first time – decided to join the campaign, partnering up with Wolverhampton Fairtrade Partnership who were the first in the country to be awarded Fairtrade status by the Fairtrade Foundation, an accolade they have now held for 19 years.

"Fairtrade is a really important initiative where, if you buy food and drink from Fairtrade, part of that money is used to help farmers in the countries producing the products to improve their lives," says Wolves Foundation's Senior Schools Officer Marnie Richards.

"It can help them receive a fair income, as well as being invested into community projects in their local areas such as transport, water supply and schools and education.

"It also helps the environment because farmers who sell Fairtrade products must follow certain guidelines such as improving soil and water quality, avoiding using harmful chemicals and reducing their greenhouse gas emissions. "You can buy Fairtrade products all the year around but this fortnight is about bringing together local businesses and organisations to raise awareness and celebrate the positives."

The Wolverhampton Fairtrade Partnership was initially set up by former MP Lord Bilston Dennis Turner, and current chair Julia Farrell recently visited Molineux to confirm the new partnership. Julia met with Marnie and Wolves Foundation

Schools' Officer Jeevan Kang, who has also been leading on a special project which will conclude during Fairtrade Fortnight.

"Jeev has been delivering a Fairtrade workshop via a six-part programme at Stowlawn Primary School which will then finish, here at Molineux, on March 1st," added Marnie.

"This will include fun activities such as football sessions, Fairtrade workshops and a tour of the Stadium."





As Prince of Wales, Charles has been preparing for this moment for most of his life, under the tutelage and guidance of his late mother, Elizabeth II. He will be recorded in history as the longest ever heir apparent, and the oldest to ever accede to the British throne at the age of 73.

Charles Philip Arthur George was born on 14th November 1948, during the reign of his grandfather King George VI. After the death of the King in 1952, his mother Elizabeth became Queen and Charles became heir to the throne at just three years old.

Charles was educated at Cheam and Gordonstoun schools, in the footsteps of his father Philip. He was the first heir apparent to attend school rather than receive private tuition. His time at Gordonstoun was hard, he referred to it as "Colditz in kilts" but later reflected, "...it taught me to accept challenges and take the initiative." He left in 1967 with six O levels and two A levels in French and History.

Charles went on to read Archaeology and Anthropology, then switched to History at Trinity College, Cambridge. He gained a 2:2 Bachelor of Arts in 1970. As Prince of Wales, he also spent a term at the University College in Aberystwyth, in order to study the Welsh language and history. In 1975, Cambridge University awarded him a Master of Arts.

Charles joined the Royal Air Force and trained as a jet pilot, then the Royal Navy, where he qualified as a helicopter pilot. The Prince's Trust was founded in 1976 with the £7,500 severance pay from the Navy. Since then, Charles has established sixteen more charities which raise over £100 million annually.

In 1981, he married Lady Diana Spencer. They had two sons, William born in 1982 and Harry in 1984. The couple divorced in 1996, and Diana was tragically killed in a car accident a year later.

In 2005, Charles married Camilla Parker-Bowles. The official title of Princess of Wales was never publicly acknowledged, instead Camilla became known as the Duchess of Cornwall.

The Duchy of Cornwall Estate was established by Edward III in 1337 for the heir to the throne. As Duke of Cornwall, the 53,000 hectare estate provided Charles with a private income to fund public, charitable and private activities, effectively making him financially independent. The estate passed to Prince William when he became heir apparent.

On 8th September 2022, Queen Elizabeth passed away peacefully and King Charles III became the new monarch. Coronation plans have been laid out for many years, under the codename 'Operation Golden Orb'. It's thought that the service will be smaller than the last coronation in 1953, and include different faiths and communities to reflect the change in British society. The Church of England ceremony will be broadcast internationally, and requires an oath and anointment, delivery of the orb and enthronement. The coronation of King Charles III and Camilla takes place in Westminster Abbey on 6th May 2023. Long live the King!



Caring for your Photographs




Hello, my name is Tim Hamilton. At my place of work, I have fried fish and chips, boiled and rolled Dandelion and Burdock flavoured suck and dressed up in Victorian costume... You guessed it; I work at the Black Country

Living Museum. I currently form part of the Collections Team helping take care of the 80,000 plus objects which have been acquired from local businesses and donated by people in the community over the last 50 years, all of which contributes to telling the story of the Black Country.



With Christmas and the New Year well behind us Spring Time is just around the corner and we tend to start to thinking about having a good old fashioned spring clean. Sorting out attics, garages and sheds. Inevitably, people will come across shoe boxes of certificates, cards, letters and photographs. We rummage through them, reminisce, distract ourselves from the cleaning bit we actually intend to do and the things which are most important to us get shoved back in their box and forgotten about until the next deep clean or house move. That's because

most of us don't know how to properly care for our treasured possessions. So, with that in mind, here are some really simple tips for preserving and protecting your photograph collection from degradation while still using, enjoying and getting the most out of it.



I spend a lot of time looking at old photographs and while sometimes it is possible to research or guesstimate a date or location based on clues within the image, there is nothing quite like when the context is already defined. If you have a lot of photos which span decades, or have photos you've acquired from family; I'd recommend taking a soft pencil and making a note on the back with all the things you can remember about it and the people or places depicted. If you become stuck and don't know where to start, the famous story writing prompts: "Who, What, Where, When & Why" are a great place to start. If you do get into a groove where you feel an anecdote or short story about what happened before or after the photo was taken is appropriate, it might be better to jot it down in a specific notebook or journal, numbering both the photographs and the journal entries so they can be easily matched up.

As well as having the context, it's even better of course when photographs are in good nick. Over time, photos will get bent, folded or torn especially if you like to get them out regularly to show family and friends. The first step is making sure you have a tidy space such as a table to get them out on and that the area is free of drinks, food or ink pens which could spill or leak. While this might sound a bit OTT, I'm not going to recommend wearing gloves! Honest. Wearing gloves while handling any archive material can actually limit dexterity and cause more accidents. Instead, ensuring everyone has clean, dry hands, should be more than enough to keep your photographs clean and ship-shape for years to come.

When it comes to packaging, it'll really depend on the type of collection you have, your budget and whether or not it's even that important to you. But if you do decide to go down the professional archival route, you can shop at preservation equipment stores for acid free and museum grade polyester wallets which clip into a binder or can be laid flat in storage boxes and are available to specifically hold everything from glass slides and film negatives to Polaroids and postcards. But if that all sounds a bit onerous, an ordinary album with individual pockets will do the trick and is far more preferable than being stacked unprotected in a shoebox, or taped or glued into a scrap book!

For photos you want on display, consider having them copied and only displaying the re-print or making sure to switch the photos out





every so often. Sun light damage is, sadly, inevitable and you might not notice until it's too late.

Finally, where you store your photographs when they're not in use can be just as important as how they're stored. Are they on a shelf near the fireplace?, in a suitcase in the loft?, on a side table for easy access? or perhaps they are in your kitchen or conservatory. Some of these areas would be a bit of a red flag, as they can not only fluctuate drastically in temperature and humidity but can also be places susceptible to accidents, water ingress and pests. Leading to and encouraging the growth of mould, foxing of paper, acceleration in red rot (the deterioration of old leather bound folders and books) and cold places like a kitchen with a stone floor can even attract silver fish which feed on materials such as paper, glue and photographs! Alternatively, consider storing them in an upstairs room, in or on top of a wardrobe or some similar location where they will be protected from flooding, light damage and drastic changes in temperature and humidity.

The care of photographs and object collections more broadly is a huge subject and therefore not possible to cover it in its entirety here, but do keep your eyes on the West Midlands Magazine each month for further hints and tips for caring for your collections and who knows; your prized possessions could one day make it into a museum or archive for the whole world to learn from and enjoy for generations to come.






