



### Eighth Annual 'Ride for Joe' Commemorates Legacy and Raises Funds for Midlands Air Ambulance Charity


In a heartfelt tribute to the late Joe Guy, the eighth edition of the 'Ride For Joe' is set to take place on the 09th of June 2024, starting from Aldersley Stadium.

This popular cycling event, established in memory of the aspiring professional time trial rider who tragically lost his life in 2017, continues to draw widespread support while honouring Joe's passion for cycling.

The event, which kicks off at 10 am, will feature two routes of approximately 30 and 50 miles, meandering through the scenic landscapes of Staffordshire and Shropshire. Cyclists from across the UK, including Joe's family, friends, and fellow enthusiasts, will participate in the ride, demonstrating the tight-knit spirit of the cycling community.

Co-organiser John Ireson reflects on the significance of the event, stating, "When Joe passed away, it resonated deeply, especially within the cycling community. 'Ride For Joe' exemplifies the solidarity and spirit that defines our close-knit community."





Steve Guy, Joe's father, emphasizes the event's importance, sharing, "Joe lived for bikes. He was amazing, and each year, this event serves as a poignant reminder of our wonderful son, taken from us too soon."

The 'Ride For Joe' has gained recognition, winning the Air Ambulance Community Fundraising award in 2022. Over the years, the event has raised more than £31,000 for the Midlands Air Ambulance Charity.

Craig Guy, Joe's brother, encourages participation, stating, "It's a fantastic event to honour Joe's memory and support the charity that attempted to save his life.

Come along, give it a try—it's not a race, but an opportunity to raise funds, remember Joe, and enjoy a day of cycling, smiles, and camaraderie."

### **Double Celebration for Inclusive Bilston School**

A primary school in Bilston has achieved a national award in recognition of its efforts to create a truly inclusive learning environment for its pupils.

Stowlawn Primary has been awarded an Inclusion Quality Mark (IQM), with assessors finding the school's leaders to be 'fully committed to inclusion' and making the school 'the best that it can be'.

At the same time, the school has also been recommended to become one of a select few nationally to be named a 'centre of excellence' by the IQM.

IQM assessors visited Stowlawn Primary just before Christmas, and found that staff and children working together to achieve the school's expectations to be Ready, Respectful and Safe throughout the busy day.

They noted positive interactions between staff and children in and out of the classroom, with leaders and staff 'fully committed to enabling each child to develop socially, emotionally, physically and academically in their own way and speed'.

This inclusiveness 'is fully embedded into the heart of the school' which has a 'positive family togetherness' feel.

Meanwhile, Stowlawn has also supported the reintegration of children from different backgrounds and cultures, celebrating the diverse backgrounds of its pupils with a Culture Week during which children and their families share their home countries' dress, food, music and stories.

Headteacher Kate Charles said: "Everyone at Stowlawn is delighted to have been awarded the Inclusion Quality Mark. Over the past few years, led by Stacey Whitehouse, our Assistant Headteacher for Inclusion, and Rachel Glover, our SENCo, we have worked incredibly hard to ensure our curriculum

meets the needs of all our learners – removing barriers to ensure all children are successful.

"Our important partnerships with outside agencies, and our commitment to curriculum enrichment, enable all of our pupils to engage in learning that promotes inclusion, equality and diversity."

Councillor Jacqui Coogan, the City of Wolverhampton Council's Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Work, said: "It's wonderful that the hard work of everyone at Stowlawn Primary School has been recognised with an Inclusion Quality Mark, and by being recommended to become a centre of excellence.

"I'd like to congratulate Kate Charles and her team on this excellent outcome."

It is the latest accolade for the school, which last year became a School of Sanctuary and gained the Primary Science Quality Mark.

IQM was established in 2004 with the objective of supporting both state and independent schools to become inclusive. It provides schools with a nationally recognised validation of their inclusive practice and ongoing commitment to developing educational inclusion.

### **Bradley Canal Festival Saturday 15th June 2024**

Bradley Canal Restoration Society in partnership with the Canal and River Trust are very happy to announce that the Bradley Canal Festival 2024 will be taking place at the Canal and River trust Workshops in Bradley Lane in Bilston on Saturday 15th June.



This is the third time that we have had this Festival, and the weather in both 2022 and 2023 was absolutely superb, and we hope that the tradition will continue. Over 1,000 people turned up last year, to view the stalls, and to see the amenities that are on offer.

The festival is open 10.00am to 4.00pm; all events are bookable upon the day, so please turn up early to avoid disappointment.



There is a lock gate workshop on site, one of only two within the country, (the second workshop is in Stanley Ferry in Yorkshire) which build the replacement oak canal lock gates that you see throughout the canal network. There will be experts within the workshop who will be able to answer any questions that you may have. The lock gate works have been around for 250 years, and whilst most things are as they were, it has recently made small changes to increase speed and efficiency of producing the lock gates.

There will be a number of stalls within the event which will offer food, drink, local memorabilia, and organisations promoting their work.

There will be boat trips and tours which are free of charge, so please come along and see what is gently hidden away upon your doorstep.

Bradley Canal Restoration Society is a charity set up to work towards the restoration of an infilled



section of canal in the heart of the Black Country; the infilled stretch contains 9 lock chambers, 7 of which are buried just below the surface of the footway, and in some cases are sticking above the ground; the heritage lottery semi-restored the bottom two locks about 20 years ago or so, and they were culverted to allow the seepage of water from the higher levels.

There have been working parties on the canal at the Moorcroft junction, (the end of the canal where the locks have been cleared) with a view to making more progress once the nesting season has finished.

The Canal and River Trust is a charity that cares for a 2,000 mile stretch of canals and associated waterways that has been around since the need to move heavy goods easily, over long distances, from the start of the industrial revolution.

Whilst the need to use the canals for industrial use has largely gone away, there is now very much a leisure activity within the canal network, both for leisure cruising, walking, and cycling along the tow paths, or just simply observing nature on a quiet day.



# Reg Lewis – Bilston's FA Cup Winner



An FA Cup winner's medal, a League championship medal and six goals in two Wembley finals – Reg Lewis was some footballer.

Yet when the famous sons of Bilston are compiled, the Arsenal forward rarely gets a mention. Well, he should, even though he left the town at an early age, just like celebrated poet Sir Henry Newbolt. "Play up, play up and play the game" famously wrote Sir Henry and when it came to football.

Reg, born in Bilston on March 7, 1920, certainly could play the game. In fact, he scored more goals for the Gunners than Thierry Henry.

His birth certificate reveals that Reg was the son of Stephen and Maud Lewis of 10 Lichfield Street, Bilston. His father's occupation is listed as 'stores clerk at motor works' Reg attended Archbishop Tenison's School which is across the road from the Oval. Indeed, when he was young there were big decisions that had to be made – cricket with Surrey or football with the Arsenal.

His first senior game for the Gunners was on a close-season tour to Denmark in May, 1937, and he scored in a 5-1 win over Copenhagen. The 17-year-old's Football League debut came on New Year's Day, 1938, when he deputised for England centre-forward Ted Drake and scored in a 2-1 home win over Everton. Next season Reg made 15 First Division appearances but figured mainly in the reserves. There his goal-scoring knack enabled him to set a club record, hitting 43 goals in just 31 games in the Football Combination. That total included six in one game and five in the next.

Reg played regularly for the club during the war before being called up to serve in the British Army of the Rhine.

Centre-forward for Arsenal in the first post-war league season, Reg hit 29 goals in just 28 appearances. The same number of games brought him 14 goals the following season but it helped the club become First Division champions. As such, Arsenal met Cup winners Manchester United in the Charity Shield and Reg scored two of the goals as the Gunners beat United 4-3 at Highbury. Despite approaching 30 when the 1949-50 season arrived, Reg was still a regular member of the side. Playing at inside-left, he added an FA Cup winner's medal to his trophy cabinet when he again sparkled at Wembley, scoring the goals as Arsenal beat Liverpool 2-0 in the final.

As there was a colour clash, Arsenal wore gold shirts in the final, perhaps an unintended nod towards Wolves, the nearest club to the town of Reg's birth. Liverpool wore white shirts and black shorts. It was one-time Wolves player Cyril Sidlow who was in goal for Liverpool at Wembley and he was beaten by Reg in the 17th and 63rd minutes.

With players like Chelsea's Tommy Lawton, Newcastle's Jackie Milburn and Blackpool's Stan Mortensen around, Reg had little chance of England recognition but his Cup exploits did help him win a place on the England B team's tour in the summer of 1950. He played in the side beaten 5-0 by Italy B and was then twice on the mark in a 2-1 win over Luxembourg.

By the time he retired in 1953, Reg had made 176 appearances for Arsenal and had amassed 118 goals. That total puts him 12th among the club's all-time goalscorers. Top of the list is Thierry Henry with 228 from 377 games, yet if wartime matches were included Reg would total 256 from 298. Small wonder that Reg is one of 32 Arsenal greats on murals that adorn the outside of the Emirates Stadium. His image is on a section with those of Patrick Vieira, Lee Dixon and Mercer.

Have you ever done something for nothing? You probably have. Maybe you've put the neighbours' bin out while they're away, or done their shopping when they're ill.

That's really all volunteering is. Being a good person. Helping someone or some people to make the world a slightly better place.

Surely, that's what we all want, isn't it?

Bizarrely, when I was growing up, I was led to believe that volunteers were not to be trusted....Do-gooders was a name I often heard them called. How strange that people who help others should be thought of detrimentally.

If you live alone or are retired, your local community centre could be an option. Pop in and ask if they need volunteers. You will find they're usually very welcoming and being involved might widen your circle of friends.





**Black Country History with Tim Hamilton** 

### Money, Money... Must be Funny



Hello, my name is Tim Hamilton. I've been passionate about history since childhood; in part due to all our family holidays to steam rallies, classic car shows, battle re-enactments and heritage craft fairs

which our calendars and lives revolved around. I have worked with museums for over 10 years and now form part of the Collections Team at the Black Country Living Museum where we take care of the 80,000 plus objects which have been acquired from local businesses and donated by people in the community over the last 50 years. In 2023 I began volunteering as a Trustee at the British Association for Local History, a national charity which promotes local history by offering talks and lectures, we host a podcast and publish a range of material from books to journals and a local history magazine.

Harry Norman
Ecclestone was born to
Harry (A businessman
in the furniture trade)
and Kate (a
dressmaker) on
January 21st, 1923, in
Coseley where he was
raised. Having
attended Bilston
School of art as a boy
of 11, he went on to



the Birmingham College of Art in 1939. While his training was interrupted with four years of service in the Royal Navy during the Second World War, upon his safe return he dived back into his passion, became an associate of the

Royal Society of Printmakers and progressed his education at the Royal College of Art in London, on a scholarship, where he studied engraving under Professor Robert Austin (who designed the first £1 banknote depicting the Queen) from 1947 and 1951.

Having moved to London, Harry took up a job teaching illustrating and printmaking at a college in Essex in order to support his young wife Betty and his daughters whilst continuing to practice his craft.



His talent, skill and dedication to his work brought him great recognition and in around 1958 Ecclestone was brought on by his former professor at the Bank of England. In 1967 The Bank of England created a new role for him to fill as the first full-time banknote designer. In his capacity at the Bank of England Eccleston worked on many projects revolutionising the way banknotes were designed, used, and protected against forgery. For example: the use of computer engraving, perception research, the use of watermarks, security thread and consistent background colours. Not only were all these measures taken up, but they are also still used today.

#### **Bilston School Of Art**


We have some really impressive buildings in Bilston, and each have a story to tell if you dig deep enough. On Mount Pleasant, Just a couple doors down from The Robin sits the impressive Bilston School of Art. It is a red brick and terracotta building with balustrades, decorative urns and pediments which more than hint at the classical inspiration for its architecture, but it also has huge almost factory-like windows. It was built between 1896 and 1897 to commemorate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. Historian Bev Parker reveals on their website for the Wolverhampton History and Heritage Society that the plans for building it were "borrowed" from an architect in Glasgow, but they soon realised the plans were for a building that sat on sloping ground so the earth at the Bilston site had to be excavated to match. While it is completely derelict today it was once a thriving hub of education and community, and we will most certainly discuss this and other buildings in the future. The building was sold at auction in October 2023, along with planning approval for conversion into residential properties. I'm all for breathing new life into historical buildings if and when they cannot be used as community spaces.



In 1978, the Series D banknotes came into circulation, and they ran until 1988. For the first time British banknotes were fully pictorial with Quen Elizabth II on the front and Ecclestone's drawings of historic figures on the reverse. Some of you may even recall who was depicted on the notes, but for those who don't the characters and denominations were as

follows. £1: Isaac Newton, £5 Duke of Wellington, £10 Florence Nightingale, £20 William Shakespeare, and £50 Christopher Wren. I can imagine it must be a very funny feeling to have your artwork so well circulated it could be found in the back pocket or purse of almost every person in the country.

While Harry Ecclestone lived in London for the remainder of his life, he frequently visited the Black Country and was inspired by the sound and visual landscape of his industrial homeland. Just a few years before he passed away in 2010, he made a significant donation of his prints and sketch pad (where in the drawings pictured are taken), accompanied with an oral history to the Black Country Living Museum.

### **Tribute to Alexen Henriquez (2006-2023)**

Having lost a leg to cancer prior to his arrival at Ormiston SWB Academy, Alexen had already faced challenges beyond the comprehension of most.

This to Alexen, however was inconsequential. Despite his debilitating illness, he never lost his 'funny'. His smile was incomparable, his energy for life infectious. He was the first on the football pitch, intent to live his life with his friends to the fullest and this continued when, at the start of Year 11, Alexen's cancer returned leaving him with a terminal prognosis he was acutely aware of.

His indominable spirit pervaded his entire outlook. With a mantra that encouraged all to 'be a rainbow in someones's cloud', Alexen leaves a considerable hole here at SWB. He forged the very best of relationships with staff and students alike and built memories that they look back fondly on now.





After the tragic loss of Alexen, the Ormiston SWB community wanted to do something, so we decided upon 'Cancer Research' being our nominated charity.

We have had multiple fund raising events which everyone has supported.

These have included:

- Non Uniform days
- Wear it Pink Days
- Raffles
- Cake Sales

Further to our fundraising, on the 21st March 2024, we held our first ever 'Race for Life'. 1300 students and staff participated in this event by walking (1 mile) or running (2 miles) around a route on our academy premises.

With students able to dedicate their efforts to someone close to them who has or is suffering from this horrible illness, made this a very emotional day.







Our target in September was £3000, with an aspirational target of £5000. However, in true community spirit, the staff, students and families from SWB have pushed the



figure past £8000, with some individual students raising hundreds of pounds alone (one pupil raising £400)

As a result of these efforts, this is now the most successful fundraising campaign the academy has had in the history of SWB!

To conclude our fund raising programme, our Principal Mr Mason, will now run the London marathon in April 24 in memory of Alexen.

## Bilston Congregational Church



In September this year Portway Road Congregational Church in Bilston celebrates its 60th anniversary. The foundation stone was laid by Mr Fred Wolverson in 1963, Fred was a former Mayor of Bilston.

The then congregation had moved from Oxford Street. This was a real leap of faith because the original church building was very much loved. Sadly it was in a bad state of repair with esculating restorational costs. Although they loved their church building the act of witness was considered more important and this became the the driving force behind the move.

The members did not move into the new church right away. For at least another 12 months the fellowship worshiped in a wooden hut in Bunkers Hill Lane. It was therefore some time before the first service was held at Portway Road.

It is important that Oxford Street is mentioned because the sixty years witness at Portway Road does not cover the full history of the Congregational Church in Bilston. As already stated the original church was in Oxford Street, and it is believed that that the church was built around the same time as St. Leonard's Church, so that would make it around 1826.

Thanks to the meticulous efforts of the late – Linda Lawton – Portway Rd has volumes of photograthic memories that records their Portway Road history in the town. Sadly there does not seem to be much information available relating to the old church in Oxford Street. I did

however find a photograph of the old church in one of Linda's volumes. Although not perfect at does show internal and external images of Oxford Street Congregational Church (see photograph herewith along with a photograph of the new church in Portway Road)

Todays church is still very active within the local community. In the late eighties the church was able to secure funding from a government initiative called, Manpower Services Commission. The funding allowed the setting up of a community project which became known internally as The Project.. The facilities included, a mother and toddler group - youth club - and a day centre for the elderly. Although the project has ceased to exist the church community still do their level best to meet the local needs with coffee mornings - table top sales - concerts and other events as required by the communiv. In July this year a special service will be held to celebrate and thank God for all the achievments. (time of service still to be agreed) It is interesting to note that the only people to leave the church are those who have either moved away to another area or those that have passed away.

At Portway Road Congregational Church you will find a friendly group of believers who sincerely do their best to love the Lord and follow his example for the Glory of God.

There are those who have a distorted view of Congregationalism and assume that it some form of modern church that ignores the basic principles of the Christian faith. Nothing is further from the truth. We share the same common inheritance as do the Catholic Church - Anglican and others. What is different about us is that we have a very realistic way of being Church. We do not have a hierarhy that dictates our spiritual direction. Most Congregational Churchs are affiliated to the Congregational Federation based in Nottingham. The Federation was set up in 1972 and it exists to offer advice and support on a wide range of matters as well as providing ordinational training for those who believe that God has called them to ministry.

Some of the guiding principles of Congregationalism include:

- · A church where Christ is the head.
- A meaningful relationship with God and with each other.
- A church of equality both male and female equally doing our best to serve God through our Lord Jesus.

This enactment of our Christian faith has a long and steady history. It has been said that a form of Congregationalism was evident in some of the churchs set up by and referred to in St Pauls letters. Apart from the elders who sent either letters or emmiseries to Paul there seems to be no hierarchy as in the established church of today.

Seeing that Elizabeth 1st was by nature a Protestant it seems strange that the Congregationalist did not do very well under her reign, this distrust carried on into the Stuart dynasty. Many Congregationalists were thrown into prison, exiled and even put to death. As a part of the Puritan movement all Congregationalsts wanted to do was to purge the church of what they percieved as hypocrisy and superstition. The name congregational is simply taken from who they were – members of congregations who challenged the authoritive rule of the established church. The followers believed that they had the right to govern themselves without any outside interferance or hierachy.

One of the earliest Congregational communities were seized at Plumbers Hall, London in 1567. They had been granted a licence to perform a marriage ceremony but were actually caught in an act of worship. Yet inspite of the monarchy's practice of putting such people to death, the numbers of Congregationalists continued to grow.

It was under Oliver Cromwell's leadership, lasting Congregationalism became legal and some leaders sat in on the Westminster Assembly in the 1640's. Although general agreement was reached at that time, as to a way forward, Congregationalists still believed that they needed to establish themselves and their identity.

The Congregational way became more prominent in the 17th centuary civil wars. It's origins in England were thought to be connected to the Separatist movement of the 16th centuary and a man named Robert Browne. This man has been regarded by some to be the founder of Congregationalism, This view can be challenged for a number of reasons.


- Robert Browne was a man who often changed his mind.
- Congregational views were evident even before Robert Browne
- Robert Browme was connected to the Brownist Christian group of the 16th centuary who refered to themselves as - The Saints.
- In later life Robert Browne was reconcilled to the Anglican church and was later ordianed as an Anglican priest.

The Saint's by themselves and the the seperatists by the outsiders. Whatever they are called they certainly wanted a break from the Anglican church. As I said earlier Robert Browne often changed his mind and obviously did as he eventually become ordained as an Anglican minister.

"Mom would put 'er arms round me -Un' give me a goodnight kiss, What aer'm tryin' ter say -This is what ar miss!"


Ar said, "Ar've got the message -Ar know weer yow'm coming from! Ar'I get me bike aert the shed – Un' goo un' fetch yer mom!"


