

Volunteering

Have you ever done something for nothing? You probably have. Maybe you've put the neighbours' bin out while they're away, or done their shopping when they're ill.

That's really all volunteering is. Being a good person. Helping someone or some people to make the world a slightly better place.

Surely, that's what we all want, isn't it?

Bizarrely, when I was growing up, I was led to believe that volunteers were not to be trusted....Do-gooders was a name I often heard them called. How strange that people who help others should be thought of detrimentally.

I've since realised that those giving out the negative labels were the ones that didn't want to do anything for anyone except themselves and just wanted to deflect their laziness onto others with a bit more community spirit.

I know a few schools that need people to step up, so give your local school a call. They might just be pleased to hear from you.



Wildlife in Wednesfield

Goodness me! Hasn't it been the wettest, warmest February and March on record? The aquifers underground are all full and the water table is at the highest point I can remember, with a relatively small amount of rain causing flooding all over the place. I drive down to South Wales regularly and the daffodils along the M50 and adjacent woodlands are all in flower and the verges are festooned with primroses – spring has already sprung, albeit a wet beginning!

Very shortly we will start to see the annual passage of migrant birds from points south reaching our shores to breed. I've written previously about the ones we all know and love, such as swallows and the songster warblers, but this month I want to focus on four of the lesser known ones, all of which I've seen locally.

The Wheatear is a lovely little bird with a black cheek. In flight it shows a white rump and a black 'T' shape on its tail. It's about the size of a robin and doesn't breed locally, but I see them almost every year as they pass through to their high



hill and mountain breeding areas further north. If you should be walking along the Essington ridge or across the Linthouse fields, or indeed on a day trip through the Welsh mountains, keep an eye open for these delightful birds. They tend to perch in the open, or on fences so are quite easy to notice.



Another bird that breeds in similar habitats to the Wheatear and also passages through this area is the Ring Ouzel. Ring Ouzels are slightly smaller and slimmer than a Blackbird. Males

have distinctive black plumage with a pale wing panel and striking white breast band. I've only ever seen one in these parts, but friends have seen them several times and six appeared on one memorable occasion! Like the Wheatears, the Ring Ouzels have been seen in the horse and pig fields in Essington, between Black Cat Wood (where they've been known to roost) and the fruit farm.

A bird that I have seen in Wednesfield for pretty much every year for as long as I can remember, is the Yellow Wagtail. The Yellow Wagtail has is similar habits to the familiar and prolific Pied Wagtail but is vellow.



Yellow Wagtails aren't the most common of birds and can be confused with Grey Wagtails, which are grev on top and yellow underneath. The best place to see these gorgeous, water loving yellow birds is along the canal towpath and for me it's the stretch between Devil's Elbow Bridge and **Broad Lane North** bridge that's been most productive. The quieter times of

day have produced the best results, but they're not birds you can really 'plan' to see.

The fourth bird I want to mention is one that you're unlikely to see, but may well hear; the Grasshopper Warbler. I had to wait until my late 40s to see one of these frustratingly difficult birds to see, although I'd heard them dozens of times.

The quintessential 'little brown job' the Grasshopper Warbler is so called because its call sounds exactly like a grasshopper, but louder. With a characteristic rounded tail and heavy dark streaking, it is readily identifiable, but its call is the most telling sign. Frustratingly, these birds run along the ground under the bushes where they generally sing fairly low down and can be impossible to spot. It's easy to think there are four or five of them in one bush when there is only one!

Well, that's it for this issue, so don't forget to look up, look down, look all around and keep enjoying our wildlife.

Willenhall Based Will Writer Jim Stanistreet, from BensonWilliams, Shares a Few Thoughts on Lasting Powers of Attorney



I owe Martin Lewis a pint. Whenever he features estate planning on one of his shows he is a massive advocate of advising people to make "Lasting Powers of Attorney", and invariably I get a spate of incoming calls from people following up on his words of wisdom!

It has to be said that he isn't wrong. Scary statistics but in The UK every three minutes a new case of dementia is diagnosed. The condition currently affects over 700,000 people and it is estimated this figure will rise to one million by 2025. One in fourteen people over sixty five are affected, and one in six over eighty. A fairly obvious comment, but the numbers are rising dramatically as we are living longer.

If somebody loses capacity to make decisions and no forward planning is in place the road forward is expensive, stressful, and time consuming. An application to The Court of Protection has to be made for somebody to become a "Deputy". This takes several months, the person who has lost capacity has no say over who is appointed, and the cost will typically be over £2,000, followed by ongoing annual supervision and indemnity charges of around £500.

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 enables people to plan ahead for this by creating a Lasting Power of Attorney. This is a document that a person (the Donor) creates whilst they still have capacity to make decisions, in which they appoint somebody else (an Attorney) to act on their behalf if they lose capacity. Three big advantages of an Attorney over a Deputy are there are no time delays (the power would already be in place before the person loses capacity), the Donor gets to choose the Attorney(s) themselves, and the court and professional fees are a fraction of the costs stated above.

This doesn't interfere with a person's right to act for themselves and make their own decisions. The Mental Capacity Act creates a "presumption of capacity" meaning that everybody retains the right to make their own decisions until it is proved that they can't. Attorneys must be seen to support a Donor in making their own decisions for as long as possible, must act in the best interests of the Donor, and must be able to demonstrate that anything they do is the least restrictive course of action based on the Donor's basic rights and freedoms.

Making a Lasting Power of Attorney is inexpensive, brings peace of mind, and doesn't interfere in any way with a person's right to handle their own affairs.

Is Barlow back... for good?

Following last year's release of their charttopping album *This Life,* Take That are ready to return to the stage with a show that promises to enthral. Naturally, their chief songwriter, Gary Barlow, couldn't be more excited.

In June 2023 the iconic pop group Take That announced a grand return to the stage with This Life On Tour – a spectacular 29-date journey across 15 cities, marking their first major outing since their hiatus between 2019 and 2023

The tour will not only cover major cities like Leeds, Dublin, London, Glasgow, Manchester and Birmingham but also includes several other UK landmarks, such as Plymouth, Swansea and Nottingham.

After the final UK date in Bristol on Saturday June 8th, the boys will move on to a series of shows in key European cities, including Berlin, Rome and Madrid. Reflecting on the band's journey and the excitement of touring again, the 53-year-old enthuses: "Every time we step on stage, it's a new adventure. The thrill of performing live, the energy from the crowd – it's irreplaceable. This tour, with our new music, feels like we're starting a fresh chapter and we can't wait to share it with everyone."

Known for their dynamic live performances and a string of

hits dating back to the 1990s, they are expected to deliver a mix of new tracks from This Life along with their classic hits, offering a full spectrum of their musical journey.

As Barlow puts it: "It's not just a tour; it's a thank you to our fans, a nod to our past and a toast to the future."






Memories of Our Wednesfield

Local Historian Ray Fellows shares a letter from Pam and Keith Stanton, where Pam Stanton (nee Wagstaff) tells us about her school days spent in Wednesfield.





The old Wood End infant School built 1875

"I started school after the Easter holidays in 1948 when I was just five years old. My mum took me to Wood End Primary School the first day, but I was expected to make my way there and back from then on, as well as come home for lunch. I didn't mind at all as I was always very independent.

I did have a couple of worries about the journey though and they were a motorbike and a naughty boy! The motorbike used to come out of the houses on Wood End Road just before the Castle pub but on the opposite side of the road. I used to cross over as I was scared he would run me over as he sped down his drive to the road. It was so loud! Then I had to cross back before I reached the Old School which seemed to curve round the bend.

This lad used to wait round this bend and strike matches to throw at the girl's legs as they went passed. I was so glad when he went to the "Big School"

I loved that school. I remember the large grass playing field and the side one behind the cloakrooms and the reception classroom.

This one had a huge grassy mound all across it. I think it was the air raid shelter during the war. The school was an E shape but the middle bit was the only covered in corridor and was at the side of hall. During my time there the hall was divided by a curtain and used as two classrooms. I can't remember many teacher's names but I think the reception was Miss Huddleston. There was a Mr Willis who took the first class of the juniors and a Mrs Davenport who took the top class. Mr Shannon was the headmaster and he was lovely. In fact, I liked all of my teachers at Wood End and I was sorry to leave.

My Secondary School was in Woodgreen, Wednesbury so I had to go by coach. We had to wait by the bus stop where the trolley buses turned round. If you missed the coach, it was three buses to get to school, via Willenhall and Walsall with a long run through Willenhall and an even longer run through Walsall to the bus station for the Wednesbury bus.

I took to going on my bike after the first year whenever I missed the coach. Because I was out of the village during those years I didn't get to know as many people as my two brothers. They both went to Ward's Bridge School and kept in touch with many school friends long after they grew up.

I read some memories from a lady called Sybil who lived in Lewis Grove. I did wonder if her maiden name was Alexander as we lived at number 4 and an Alexander family lived opposite. The eldest girl was named Sybil. Lewis Grove is a cul-de-sac of 22 houses and I have been trying to remember who lived there in the 40's and 50's. I know the Thomas family lived at number 3 as their

little girl, Janet, was my bridesmaid when I got married in 1966 at St Thomas's Church in the village.

The Terry family lived at number 5 and had a girl a bit older than me called Rita. A bachelor named Mr Johns lived at number 6 and at number 7 there was a lad called Bruce. He often played with my brothers and sometimes we played in his garden. Number 8 housed the Prince family and I was good friends with their daughter Jackie. I was very upset when they left to go to live in Corby.

At number 12 was a family called Saunders and their youngest lad worked for the Council on the dustbins. Number 13 had a blonde girl about my age and then we came to number 14. These last few houses had really wide back gardens as they fanned out around the circle at the top of the cul-de-sac. I remember number 14 so well because when I was 8 the Newell family moved in. They had one daughter, Anne. We have been good friends ever since and still see each other regularly. Anne's dad was a good gardener with lovely lawns and flower beds and a vegetable patch. He also had an aviary with a lot of budgies. Their garden was hedged at the bottom but with a gap which led into a grass 'no man's land' which led down to the canal. Anne and I used to play in this patch for hours and used to sail oxo tins as boats on the canal! No health and safety then!

Number 17 housed the Martin family and although there were several children I can only remember one name and that is Peter. Then came the Alexanders, Sybil was the eldest and the youngest was Kenny. The only other names I remember were the Westons at 22.

Mr Weston was a keen gardener, his wife, a sweet lady, out lived him by several years. The Habberley family lived on the opposite corner to the Westons. Carol was in my class at school and the others were Roy, Pete and Joy. Pete and my brother Graham were good friends for years".










Real-Life Spooky Stories Inspire Author of Chilling New Novel By Black Country Journalist



A chilling new supernatural thriller by an award-winning former Black Country journalist has been inspired by real-life ghost stories from the region.

13 Doors, by G J Phelps, tells the story of a reporter who sets out to spend the night in thirteen genuinely haunted locations, with terrifying consequences.

And the author – real name Gary Phelps – has drawn on actual local ghost stories that he collected over a 30-year career in newspapers to create the book.

Gary, who used to edit the Walsall Advertiser and covered news in the Black Country for many years, said: "All newsrooms have odd, unexplainable stories, where a member of the public has brought in a tale which the journalists just couldn't explain.

"After working in news for years, I've collected them – particularly from around the West Midlands – and when I came to write 13 Doors, I thought it would be interesting to weave them into the story.

"For example, there's a story based on an interview I did with the manager of haunted pub in

Sutton Coldfield, back when I was a reporter, and a fantastic story about a local van driver who ran over a ghost.

"Another chapter in the book was inspired by the mine at the Black Country Living Museum."

13 Doors is also largely set in the region, with locations like the Victorian cemeteries in Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter playing a key part in the story.

In the supernatural thriller, news reporter Joe Baxter sets out to stay in 13 genuinely haunted locations, finding them through his contacts at newspapers across the UK.

Author Gary explained: "I have always been a devotee of horror and supernatural fiction and, as an Eighties kid, grew up watching classic movies of the time.

"I wanted to write a book that paid homage to those influences, while adding something new and different to the genre. Most of all, I wanted to write a horror novel that was rooted in my iournalistic background.

"So, while 13 Doors is fiction, there are a handful of stories and anecdotes in it that are based on real stories – stories that journalists couldn't explain."
